Prescriber Requirements

A prescriber must not issue an electronic prescription unless it includes the required data fields:

- Prescriber name, practice address and telephone number
- Date of issue
- Patient's full name and address
- Patient's date of birth (in the case of a Schedule 8, Schedule 9 or monitored poison)
- Name, strength, form and quantity of the medicine
- The precise dose or use and frequency, except in cases described in the regulations
- Maximum number of times the medicines may be supplied (# of repeats), if any
- The Victorian warrant number for retinoids (e.g. acitretin, oral isotretinoin), ovulatory stimulants (clomiphene, cyclofenil), prostaglandins (e.g. dinoprost) plus thalidomide and lenalidomide (Note To accommodate Victorian requirements software vendors will need to include a field where the warrant number can be entered by the prescriber. It could state 'Permit/warrant number', if needed to accommodate other States where a permit number is needed.)

Additional requirements of relevance to software vendors:

• The clinical or medication record of the person for whom the prescription was issued must be preserved for at least one year from the date on which

	 the prescription was generated and be capable of being accessed when required. The computer program must restrict access to the prescription module to authorised persons.
